



WHITEBARK PINE FRIENDLY SKI AREA

Whitebark Pine are DECLINING
due to:

- blister rust (a non-native fungus)
- bark beetles
- warmer temperatures
- altered fire regimes

Whitebark pine trees are often prominent at ski areas such as this one, where they provide the important service of shading and preserving snowpack.
